

Resolution Proposal 1

WHEREAS, there is a much lower turnout during Partisan Primaries, and

WHEREAS, the local Board of Elections and local Parties do not do a well enough job to inform and educate the public on non-partisan elections, and

WHEREAS, having non-partisan general elections held during the Partisan Primaries lowers the number of persons participating in the non-partisan general elections, and

WHEREAS, the non-partisan governmental agencies have the highest taxing authority in Chatham County, GA.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Chatham County Republican Party fully supports, promotes, and pushes for all General Elections to be held in November no matter of status of Partisan or not.

Resolution Proposal 2

WHEREAS, non-partisan races have only increased Democrat control in local government agencies throughout Chatham County, GA, and

WHEREAS, the Chatham County Republican Party wants to increase Republican held seats in local government, and

WHEREAS, candidates have run as a Republican friendly candidate, then govern as an extreme Democrat, and

WHEREAS, it shows the public transparency on each candidate if they have to declare a party affiliation, and

WHEREAS, the Chatham County Republican Party understands the need to have an apolitical judicial.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the Chatham County Republican Party supports, promotes, and pushes for legislation to have all local races, except for Judges, to be partisan and to have all said races to be partisan by the 2024 election cycle if not sooner.

Resolution Proposal 3

A Resolution in Support of Passing an Alternative to the ACA (ObamaCare) in Georgia

WHEREAS the Affordable Care Act that Congress passed without reading its 2600 pages is a fiscal disaster, and needs \$32 billion a year in subsidies for the next two years to keep the remaining exchange insurers functioning, and

WHEREAS Democrats still criticize the GOP for a lack of a specific way to reform it; even conceding it is not functioning well and

WHEREAS there is a way to guarantee affordable health coverage by state, that adheres to conservative principles of the free market, and is way better than massive federal overreach into one sixth of the American economy; and

WHEREAS the Georgia governor and a legislative sponsor now have a bill designed to grant guaranteed health insurance access to all Georgia citizens, guaranteed access to means-tested subsidies for pre-existing conditions, and health insurance rating based on sound actuarial principles to preserve the viability of non-governmental insurance policies; and

WHEREAS the U.S. Supreme Court, if granted cert, would find that Georgia's new health insurance is Constitutional, but the ACA is not allowed to mandate free pre-existing condition coverage on private insurance policies, so the ACA would be found unconstitutional. Then other states would be free to emulate Georgia's new system, or pass alternatives based on their states' needs.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT: The Chatham County Republican Party urges Georgia to adopt this proposed alternative to the ACA.

Resolution Proposal 4

A Resolution in Support of a State Fair Tax for Georgia

WHEREAS a key goal for Georgia and the U.S. is job creation, not only for its economic benefits to citizens, but for its contribution to American leadership around the world; and

WHEREAS any system that taxes income: penalizes investment in Georgia, lowers workers' take home pay, hurts job creation, and helps to export jobs to other places; and

WHEREAS visitors pay no income taxes, but would pay by a consumption tax; and

WHEREAS, taxing retail consumption rather than personal and corporate income:

- Increases take home pay,
- Encourages investment in Georgia to create more jobs,
- Produces tax revenue from the underground economy that currently pays no income tax;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Chatham County Republican Party urges the Georgia legislature to adopt a state Fair Tax that:

1. Eliminates the Georgia state income tax completely;
2. Broadens the base of the state sales tax (to offset all revenue lost from the elimination of the state income tax) by adding services to the list of goods and services subject to the new sales tax; and
3. Is revenue neutral overall to the state, by a minimal increase in the state retail sales tax rate.
